Headmaster's Message

Real Gold

This year we have been fortunate in that we have received visits from many eminent scholars. A few weeks ago, another distinguished educationist visited the School. He had served for three years in various Continental schools and some of his observations were most interesting. In some schools, for example, if a teacher had to say to a student on more than one occasion: "Wolfgang, your conduct is interrupting the work of this class," that student, if reported to the Headmaster, would be told to enrol somewhere else. In other words, pupils could be expelled from certain types of schools because of repeated misconduct in class or any type of behaviour considered disruptive. The reason for this drastic action came from two sources — the community and the pupils themselves.

People in Continental countries place great value on education. If a scholar attends a school of a more academic type, the community expects him to do well — or make way for someone who is really interested in education. A Headmaster is expected by the citizens of the town to expel a pupil who will not make the most of his opportunities. In crowded communities, competition amongst students to gain a place in a school is so keen that successful ones dare not jeopardise their chance of a good schooling once they are enrolled. The result of this awareness of the value of education by citizens and pupils is that schools are really places of learning.

Teachers themselves are regarded as citizens of worth and it is a great honour to be admitted to the teaching fraternity. They are encouraged to continue their studies and some staffs have six or seven of their members with "Dr." degrees.

What has all this to do with you? Well, by comparison, education in Australia is such a leisurely affair that I think consideration of the above facts must result in some

soul-searching on the part of the more thoughtful amongst you. Are you really keen to learn? Do you take a joy in gaining knowledge for the sake of knowledge or must there be a "£.s.d." tag to all you learn? Are you making the most of your opportunities or are you hoodwinking your parents and yourself? Have you become so accustomed to material comforts that you think these things will always be yours without effort on your part?

Undoubtedly your attitude to learning could and should improve. And later on, you can do something towards altering the public attitude to scholars. Many years ago I read a story about adventurers in Africa in search of gold. They came across a tribe where all the men had hairless heads. This result was obtained by rubbing an ointment on the head. I cannot remember details but these adventurers committed all sorts of atrocities because of their greed to acquire the yellow metal and never once recognised the fact that real gold stared them in the face — the formula for ointment.

Much of Australia's real gold rests with her scholars. We will become truly great as a nation when we accord to our intellectuals at least the same public recognition and encouragement that we give to our dogs, our horses, our footballers, our swimmers, our fighters and so on. A scholar must not be regarded as a person possessing undesirable qualities; an intellectual must not be referred to with sneering contempt. Perhaps in the future you may edit a newspaper, you may run a radio or television station, you may become an executive in a big industrial concern or you may enter Parliament. What a wonderful opportunity will be yours to lead the general public to give due recognition to Australia's learned citizens — some of Australia's "real gold".

OBITUARIES



MR. FRANK BUCKLEY

Pupils, present and past, teachers, parents, and citizens generally, learned with sorrow and regret of the passing on August 11th, after a long illness, of Mr. F. Buckley. Mr. Buckley had been a member of the Staff of Wollongong High for fourteen years. He came to the school in 1945 as Mathematics Master, and in 1951 became Deputy Headmaster. His son, Peter, will be remembered by many as a Prefect and fine sportsman.

No greater tribute to his success as a teacher with a fatherly interest in his pupils and to his success as "a man's man" could have been paid than was given by the long, heartfelt sigh of regret from the assembled school in December, 1959, when it was first announced that he had at last decided to accept promotion and was to be Headmaster of Dapto High School; and by the many anxious enquiries about his well-being during his illness.

Mr. Buckley had the respect and esteem of citizens outside his profession. He was a fine sportsman, being an excellent golfer. One writer in paying tribute to Mr. Buckley, said "He proved in many walks of life that it is the person and not the equipment which makes a real sportsman."



MR. N. R. ROWLEY

News of the fatal car accident to Mr. N. R. Rowley, who had been attached to this school since 1941, first as Schools' Counsellor and then as District Guidance Officer for the Southern Area, came as a shock to all.

Mr. Rowley was a well-known figure in the Illawarra District for his official duties took him to many schools in an area extending from Helensburgh to the Victorian border; his specialised knowledge brought him contacts with many organisations; and his sporting career brought him much renown.

Teachers, pupils and parents alike all came to know and respect his advice and genial personality.

Mr. Rowley was a Double Blue at Sydney University in Rugby Union and Swimming. He was a member of North Steyne Surf Club, played "A" Grade tennis; and was a current member of Wollongong Golf Club's Pennant team.

Although he did not have much contact with pupils of Wollongong High he was well-known to them as the father of former pupil, John, who holds several school swimming records, and Wendy, popular Fifth Year Prefect.

In most respects 1960 has been a successful year so far as the Association is concerned. However, we have sustained a major disappointment in the fact that our efforts to procure a separate assembly hall for the school appear to have failed. Senior officers of the Association visited the Department of Education in Sydney by appointment and pressed the school's claims for such a hall. Notwithstanding this visit and a later offer by the Association to make a substantial contribution to the costs of the hall it does not appear that a separate assembly hall will be available to the school. No school in this area or elsewhere in the State uses its assembly hall to better advantage and the already high standard of our social functions could only be improved by the use of a modern hall.

This contention was highlighted by the fact that the main social function conducted by the Association, namely the school Ball was this year held at the school. The occasion provided a very interesting experiment and can only be described as completely successful. The financial return was approximately the same as in former years and the standard of conduct could hardly have been improved upon. It is felt that the Ball contributes in a large way to the social education of our children and parents consider themselves well rewarded for any efforts they make in connection with this social function.

Possibly the one inconvenience associated with the holding of the Ball at the school was the fact that the preparation of supper was carried out by the ladies under strange conditions. As usual they responded magnificently and the supper left nothing to be desired. Members of the P. and C. Association, staff and pupils have learnt to realise that the smooth operation of social functions in the school is almost entirely due to the magnificent work of our Ladies' Auxiliary. A separate report of the Auxiliary's activities will be found in this magazine.

The school grounds continue to improve in appearance mainly as a result of the efforts of the Grounds Committee. The area formerly occupied by the old cottage has been top-dressed and improved and is now occupied by basketball courts. Over the past few weeks we have negotiated with the Main Roads Board and are now assured that the vacant land on the north western corner of Lysaght Street and Prince's Highway will be made available to the school for use as a hockey ground. This use will continue until extensions become necessary to the new by-pass road. Work to level the field to prepare it for use will

commence as soon as present negotiations are completed.

The issue and circulation by Mr. Lenehan of "High Notes" has kept news of the activities of the Association continually under parents' notice and accordingly a repetition of these activities is hardly necessary.

While financial assistance to the school by parents will always be necessary, it is felt that parents have satisfactorily responded and have at all times met the reasonable requirements of the school.

In the face of ever-increasing difficulties the scholastic and sporting achievements of the school continue to be of the highest order. Congratulations are extended to the scholars who have maintained such a high standard and we hasten to acknowledge the part played by the staff in these achievements.
